#44 Plants and soil lose water during the day through evaporation. Watering during cooler times of the day gives the water a chance to permeate the soil and be absorbed by the roots of the plants. In hot conditions, it is better to water in the evening. In cooler conditions, though, plants can develop fungal growth from water on their leaves overnight, so it is preferable to water early in the morning. Group plants with similar water needs—place thirsty plants together and water them longer, but less often to encourage deeper roots and increase their drought tolerance. By watering wisely, you can conserve significant amounts of water.



#### **MAY GARDENING TIPS**

**Planting** - Try to get all your new perennials into the ground before the heat starts. Plant tomato seedlings. Containers with tropical plants that you have wintered over indoors can be placed outdoors this month. Move seedlings of perennials started indoors out to a sheltered area to harden them off in preparation for planting them in the open garden.

**Pruning** – Deadhead pansies, primroses, and large-flowered roses to prolong the flowering cycle. Pinch herbs to keep them

shapely. Pinch out the tips of branching annuals that develop one or more strong central stems (i.e snapdragons, salvia, petunias, basil).

# **Watering** - Check the moisture levels in large containers twice a week, and in small pots and hanging baskets every day or two; water as needed. Maintain the moisture in newly planted seeds and seedlings. If there is not a good soaking rain every week to 10 days, water planted beds gently and slowly and long enough to lay down 1 to 2 inches. Water any seedlings that show signs of wilting.

Weeds and Pests – Weeds flourish in May. Weed your garden and any adjoining sidewalks to your property. Use a hose to blow away aphids and deter spider mites and whitefies. Check hostas and other shade plants for signs of slugs and snails. Try pouring a little beer in shallow plates or empty tuna fish or cat food cans, place just below soil line.

### TREE CARE, DEVELOPING AND PRESERVING OUR TREE CANOPY

Now that the trees have leafed out, it is obvious whether or not the trees in front of your house have survived. Hopefully the trees have survived and it is time to think about how to keep them alive for another year. Fortunately, the rain has been abundant this spring providing a good environment for trees. New trees require watering throughout the summer and the use of a gator bag can make this easier. Many of the new trees have gators and they should be filled once a week when the rains are no longer providing enough water. The area around the trees should be mulched with the mulch pulled away from the base of the tree. Free mulch is available at the city mulch area off Oakwood Avenue (bring your own container).

#### MINUTES OF THE MARCH 5, 2009 BOARD MEETING

President John Johnson called the meeting to order at 7:11PM at the 2300 Club.

#### Announcements

CHA President, John Johnson, reminded everyone that the Membership meeting on April 21st will be held at Ashbury United Methodist Church. The church is located at the corner of Marshall and 29<sup>th</sup> Street and Ms. Jennifer McCellan, Member House of Delegates 71<sup>st</sup> District, will be a guest speaker.

#### Presentations

Jim and Laura Daab along with Richard and Carolyn Worssam attended the Board meeting to voice their concerns over the R-63 issue that is somewhat dividing Church Hill. After much discussion about how our community may have arrived at this sensitive juncture over this hot issue, we discussed how we can help move forward. John Johnson suggested a multi-part process to garner the wishes and support of our whole community. This is the process we discussed:

- 1. Return the issue to the Zoning Committee.
- 2. Work with Tarisa M. Griffith from the City of Richmond Department of Community Development with new zoning proposals changing the R-63 to possibly a hybrid designation rendering it less invasive and more suitable for Church Hill.
- 3. Hold a meeting to present the new hybrid zoning designation to <u>all</u> residents of Church Hill.
- 4. Send flyers advising and alerting our residents of the proposal while also adding it to Church Hill People's News along with addition in the Church Hill Newsletter to get the message out to the entire community.
- 5. Formulate and send out surveys to all residents so everyone can have a voice in this process.

6. Tarisa M. Griffith will tally and publish the results of the survey.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> John Whitworth presented the Treasurer's Report for March 2009. As of March 31, the CHA had \$41,292 cash in the bank. Cash Receipts for the month were \$1,980; expenditures were \$1,299 for an increase in cash of \$681.

#### **Old Business**

The Church Hill Book is moving further along toward publication. The first printing of Church Hill: The St. John's Church Historic District in 1991 was an enormous Due to the high demand for this book, the Historical Richmond Foundation (HRF) has decided to not only reprint the 132 original pages (with 352 original B & W photos) but to create an expanded second edition to include 84 new color photos and a total of 180 new pages. The second edition will focus on the changes to Church Hill over the decades, and will incorporate the surrounding districts of Chimborazo Park, Church Hill North, and Shockoe Valley. Each district is distinctive with many fine examples of period architecture. John Zehmer, who wrote the first edition of this book, will be the author of this expanded publication. The additional color photos will be taken by nationally renowned photographer Richard Cheek who has strong ties to Richmond and has traveled to Richmond several times to work on this project. The HRF is requesting \$2000 from the CHA in support of this book. This issue will be discussed and voted on at the Membership Meeting. Publication is expected in 2010.

HRF has donated \$2,500 in support of Committee for Architectural Review (CAR) in their decision on the Oakwood Heights development.

The historic plaques are very much alive with the endorsement of HRF. The plaques will carry the crest of HRF and CHA and will be available this summer. As stated in previous newsletters, VCU students will be making the plaques and will also be available for research on homes. Waite Rawls is heading this project and will speak to the Membership explaining all facets available.

#### **Committee Reports**

Zoning: Beth Sarrett advised the Board that Bill Hartsock has expressed his desire to become the Chair of the Zoning Committee. The Committee will vote on this and will make a recommendation to the Board. After the Zoning Committee tenders its recommendation, the Board will

vote on this issue. We are striving to have all voting complete by this month's Membership Meeting.

Motion passed by the Zoning Committee to make the following recommendation to the Board:

"The Zoning Committee supports the CHA Board in upholding the rules, procedures and By-laws in place to preserve funding expenditures. Further, the Board should request the Zoning Committee to review relevant items, with regard to pros/cons, and only then present subsequent recommendations back to the Board and Membership." This motion was supported by the Board.

Newsletter: We have a new printer for the Church Hill Newsletter. James River Press is enabling us to provide the newsletter in a PDF format. This is not only more convenient but also more economical for the CHA. The Board wishes to voice our many thanks to Erika Gay for her dedication to the newsletter for seven years and for pursuing a more reliable and economical supplier. Thanks, Erika! The Board is adding an Announcement Section to each newsletter to provide residents of important upcoming events for CHA. Please watch for it in each newsletter.

Membership: No Report Clean and Safe: No Report

Holiday: The holiday weekend this year will be held December 11, 12 and 13. Liz Steen, Holiday Ball Chair, provided a survey for residents during the Irish Festival at the CHA booth about wishes for Holiday events in future years. Liz is actually still distributing and collecting surveys so results will be published at a later date. The Holiday committee recommended having the 2009 Holiday Ball at the Holocaust Museum. The Board discussed this recommendation, voted and approved the Museum for the Holiday Ball this year.

#### New Business

City Council member Betty L. Squire held a 7<sup>th</sup> District Town Meeting along with the Mayor, Dwight Jones on March 21<sup>st</sup>. During the meeting the Mayor expressed his desire for more access to the James River for the public and for the preservation of our historic view. Anyone wishing to contact Ms. Squire can reach her at Betty.Squire@Richmondgov.com or at her office at 804.646.5429.

Effective immediately, anyone interested in applying for over \$1,000 through our Capital Expenditure process is

required to have a Project Summary Fact Flyer to further explain the destination of the requested funds. These Fact Fliers will be handed out to the CHA membership at the monthly meetings during their presentation for a better illustration of the use for proposed funding. Due diligence is needed on these fact fliers so the entire membership is well informed and can readily understand where the funds are distributed.

A new process to amend the CHA by-laws is beginning. A Committee has been formed and will be working over the next several months to update the by-laws in order for CHA to better handle current day issues.

CHA President, John Johnson, discussed with the Board members how the City has had so many budget cuts that they rely on community associations like the CHA to do much of their work. John expressed the volume of relevant issues is so large that possibly a Community Action Committee may need to be formed. The need for creating a paid position for City Liaison/Newsletter Coordinator/Secretary/Website administrator, etc., is a real possibility. Anyone wishing to discuss this matter please see John Johnson.

The Board discussed the need for an illustration at a Membership meeting on the Roberts Rules of Order as a public service. While some members know the rules and operate within them, lots of members are unaware how to operate within this meeting format and are intimidated which hampers needed membership input. A handout on this subject will be distributed at the Membership Meeting on the 21<sup>st</sup>.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:03pm.

CHA President, John Johnson, called the meeting to order at 7:05pm at Ashbury Methodist Church at 324 N 29th Street. Thank you for hosting our meeting this month! Rev. Bucher heartily welcomed everyone and revealed that Ashbury Methodist Church has given 166 years of service to Church Hill. It's a wish of the ministers and congregation to become more of a 'Village Church' where all people are welcome. The Church handed out surveys asking for feedback on such issues as community happenings that may concern you, questioning if racism and race relations are concerns in Church Hill and how can Ashbury United Methodist Church serve you. Completed surveys may be placed in the mailbox attached by the back entrance of the Church or mailed. #### Announcements

John and the membership welcomed all the new members!

The Church Hill Crime Watch invites you to the dedication of Sergeant John Henry Taylor's at Libby Hill Park, Saturday May 9th at 1pm. The bench, given by the Church Hill Crime Watch, honors retired Sergeant Taylor's 25 years of service with the Richmond City Police Department and his above and beyond care and concern for the safety of every person living on Church Hill and surrounding areas. A reception will follow until 3pm in his honor. Thank you Sergeant Taylor!

Police/Crime Report was given by Police Officer Ron McClaren. He relayed to the membership that violent crime statistics continue downward in Church Hill. However, he did report that larceny from vehicles is up with GPS systems being the hottest item. The police currently have a suspect in custody for the larcenies and, as a result, these crimes have decreased. Please always continue to remove all valuables from sight in your vehicle. #### **Presentations**

Jennifer L. McClellan, Member House of Delegates 71<sup>st</sup> District, reported that Virginia was the first state to be a

recipient of funding from the Federal Stimulus Plan. Even though Virginia had a huge deficit of 3.5 billion dollars, these funds enabled our state to halt the termination of 7,000 state employee jobs and 1,100 health care positions.

Delegate McClellan also discussed passed legislation she pioneered this past session. The Mortgage Lender and Broker Act prohibits a mortgage broker from failing to use reasonable skill, care, and diligence in exercising the broker's duty to make reasonable efforts to secure a mortgage loan that is in the best interests of the applicant, considering the applicant's circumstances and loan characteristics.

GRTC presented a power point presentation on their newly proposed MISSION 2015 transportation project. GRTC's CEO Mr. John Lewis declared their desire to move the present small bus system to a more efficient regional system. Their current transit system borders on 60% efficiency but promises 98% plus efficiency with new proposed system. The new regional transit project would move away from 'corner' stops while moving toward a one location facility. This proposed facility would be housed in an updated, renovated Main Street Station and its surrounding areas at the bottom of Church Hill.

Mr. Stephen F. McNally, Project Administrator/ Construction Manager, explained how the bus routes would enter and leave the updated station and illustrated how extensively the present station renovations are required. Both Mr. Lewis and Mr. McNally reiterated their desire to reestablish the historic integrity and the project is only 30% planned. However, several members expressed concern over the additional traffic that would be required having the hub so close to Church Hill. Roberts Rules of Order were handed out at the meeting. Due to time constraints, we were unable to discuss them at this meeting.

**Treasury Report:** John Whitworth presented the Treasurer's Report for March 2009. On March 31, the CHA had \$41,292 cash in the bank. Cash Receipts for the

month were \$1,980; expenditures were \$1,299 for an increase in cash of \$681.

#### **Committee Reports**

Membership: Benedicte Whitworth announced that we currently have 312 members in the CHA with 10 new members signed up at this meeting. Thanks Benedicte!

Newsletters: Erika Gay communicated to the membership we now have a new newsletter printer in James River Press. James River is more convenient and also less expensive. In addition, CHA President, John Johnson along with the membership recognized all the hard work Erika and Trish Bernal have put into the newsletter effort over the last 7 years. Thank you, ladies!

Zoning: Beth Sarrett introduced Bill Hartsock as the new Chair for the Zoning Committee. Congratulations, Bill! Also, John Johnson presented the 6 step process to be used in the Zoning issue concerning R-63 rezoning.

- 1. Return the issue to the Zoning Committee.
- 2. Work with Tarisa M. Griffith from the City of Richmond Department of Community Development with new zoning proposals changing the R-63 to possibly a hybrid designation rendering it less invasive and more suitable for Church Hill.
- 3. Hold a meeting to present the new hybrid zoning designation to all residents of Church Hill.
- 4. Send flyers advising and alerting our residents of the proposal while also adding it to Church Hill People's News along with addition in CHA newsletters to get the message out to the entire community.
- 5. Formulate and send out surveys to all residents so everyone can have a voice in this process.
- 6. Tarisa M. Griffith will tally and publish the results of the survey.

Holiday: Beth Sarrett asked for a volunteer to help with the Holiday House Tour. She has someone who is interested in co-chairing the Tour but needs another volunteer. Anyone interested please see Beth or any Board member. Liz Steen, Holiday Ball Chair, reported that the Ball will be held at the Holocaust Museum on December 12<sup>th</sup>. Liz is still gathering results of the surveys and will divulge results when completed.

#### **Old Business**

Several capital expenditure proposals were slated to be voted upon at this meeting.

First, \$5,000 for improvements to the Chimborazo Playground Park including picnic tables, bird and bat houses, a garden shed, 2 BBQ stands and 3 shade sails needed a vote. All the furniture will be constructed by CHAT members. This motion was approved.

Next, \$1,000 for new signage for the Grace Street Overlook of the City was a proposed capital expenditure up for a vote. The City will match this amount for construction of the new sign. This motion was approved. Third, request for \$2,000 donation to support the publishing of the new Church Hill Book to be completed by 2010. This motion was approved.

Lastly, \$1,000 in support of overturning the City Council's decision on Oakwood Heights was up for a vote. After much discussion on the pros/cons of this proposal, a motion stating "\$1,000 to HRF's effort to support citizen appeal of City Council's decision to overturn CAR's denials for certificate of appropriateness for the Oakwood Heights project." This motion was approved.

The Giant Libby Hill Summer Yard Sale will be held on June 13<sup>th</sup> this year. It's time for Spring cleaning and Spring cleanout!
