Christ's Personal Ministry and the Gentiles.

Christ's personal ministry and teaching has no direct application to the Gentiles of to-day. If we would understand the personal ministry and teachings of Christ, and their relationship to us, we must learn at least four things. (1) To whom He came, (2) Who He taught, (3) What He taught, (4) Whether we can do the things He taught. According to Matt., 2:1,2 He came as the king of Israel. He has never been, is not now, and never will be our king. He is our Head, but not our King. Pilate said, "Are you the king of the Jews?" And He answered, thou sayest it."

Speaking to the Canaanitish woman Christ said: "I am not sent but to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." This should forever settle the question as to who Jesus came. Who, then, did He teach? At least three times in His sermon on the mount He exhorted His hearers to not be like the Gentiles. Surely, then, this message was not to Gentiles, but to Jews. When one of those that Jesus taught refused to forgive a brother, after he and the Church had admonished him to, the punishment inflicted upon him was, "Let him be unto you as a heathen man and a publican. Who was the heathen man? It was none other than a Gentile. Most all Gentiles of that day were considered heathen, for they, with but few exceptions, did not worship the one true and living God. Can this apply to the Gentiles of the Body of Christ? What punish-

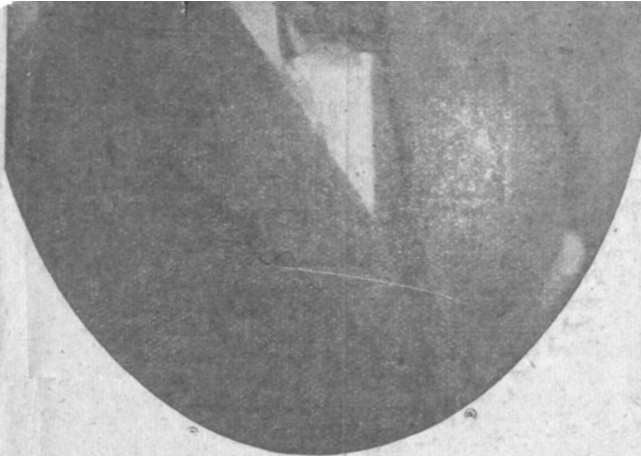

are not under law, but under
grace." Rom. 6:14. He exhorted
His hearers to "Search the
Scriptures, for in them ye think
ye have eternal life." What
Gentile of that day thought he had
eternal life in the Scriptures?
They did not believe them for
they knew nothing about them.
When Christ commissioned His
disciples to preach He told them
to, "Go not into any ways of the
Gentiles—but to go rather to the
lost sheep of the house of Israel.
They, then, were certainly not to
teach anyone but Jews. The
world wide commission, which He
gave them later is intended for
the millennial age, and has no
application now, as is evidenced by
the fact that even the apostles did
not attempt to carry it out.

So Christ, during His personal
ministry, the twelve, and the
seventy all taught Jews and Jews
only. Evidently, then, their teach-
ings are intended for them and
not for us the Gentiles. Christ
taught many things that the very
best people in the world—the most
pious church members—are not
putting into practice. If they
apply to-day, and to the members
of the Body Church, why do they
not practice them. He taught
many other things that we cannot
do now if we were anxious and
should try hard to do them. But
space will not allow us to con-
sider them now. If the Lord wills
we will consider them in the next
issue of this paper.

Suffice it to say, now that the
Lord called Paul as our apostle
herald and teacher, in knowledge
and in truth. His writings con-
tain sufficient knowledge and truth
for us if we will only put them
into practice.
